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Members and Friends,

I'd like to welcome our new members. In the last year we have added fourteen new Member Organizations, eight new Individual Members, five new Student Members, and four new Supporting Organizations to our membership. I'd also like to thank our faithful renewing members! Together we have accomplished much, and with our vision for the future; the possibilities grow each day.

CAC2 strives to bring together organizations and individuals from the childhood cancer community to collaborate on activities and initiatives within our foundational pillars: Awareness and Advocacy Support, Research and Treatment, and Family Support and Survivorship. When we surveyed our members this year, they reaffirmed the value they receive from joining CAC2: the opportunity to learn from each other, to collaborate effectively, and to have a broader impact in the childhood cancer community.

Chance to Learn—Through our bimonthly webinar series, we give our members access to the latest information from top research scientists and thought leaders from around the country and the world. In addition, our Survivorship Working Group launched a new initiative, the Survivorship Matters blog, that probes the challenges and available resources for our survivors. We also updated the oft-cited Childhood Cancer Fact Library, which provides members and the wider community with a common set of well-sourced facts, figures, and statistics about childhood cancer.

Effective Collaboration—Having completed our seventh of seven collaboration projects with the launch of the Hope Portal last June, this year our members endorsed an eighth project: a think tank initiative exploring the issues and best bioethical practices for organizations funding research. In addition to creating a collaborative environment internally so that our members can discover ways to work together, we continued to be a source of connectivity in the community, for example co-hosting activities like the Golden Toast reception in Washington DC during Childhood Cancer Awareness month and a community-wide Twitter Town Hall on pediatric brain tumors.

Broad Impact—We also provided our members numerous opportunities to participate in coordinated social media campaigns, including a major push to illuminate landmarks and public buildings throughout September, support of International Childhood Cancer Day in February, and taking the lead on a national childhood cancer anti-bullying PSA in April. Our efforts yielded major legislative appropriation success: with \$30 million in support of the STAR Act making it into the 2019 federal budget. We continue to work to involve our members in rewarding volunteer roles and have represented the childhood cancer community at countless meetings and conferences, making sure that children and adolescents have standing when decisions about research, treatment, care, and funding are considered.

The pace has quickened in our community. We have had some legislative successes that can make a real difference for our community. Industry is increasingly activated to develop therapies for our children and AYA patients. The President elevated childhood cancer to a national priority in his State of the Union message. As we prepare for our future together, informed by our members and guided by our strategic plan, we hope to honor the trust our members place in us to pursue shared goals and build credibility as a trusted partner in the community.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Sound fiscal oversight in all that CAC2 undertakes is as highly prioritized as the fundamental aspects of our mission.


In February 2019, the CAC2 Board of Directors met for two days to revisit and revamp our strategic plan to ensure focus and sustainability for a bright future of collaboration across the childhood cancer community in shared service of pediatric cancer patients, survivors, and their families. The strategy for this bright future will focus our resources on:

- Facilitating member collaboration
- Amplifying the voice of the childhood cancer community
- Aggregating and connecting information and resources from and to our members
- Serving as a trusted partner for the community
- Preparing for scalability and long-term impact

As CAC2 begins its 7th fiscal year, it does so with a solid financial footing able to support a more expansive strategy and agenda. The factors responsible for the positive financial health of CAC2 include:

- Stable membership base with a high renewal rate year on year (80-85%);
- Grant support for specific collaboration initiatives to help defray their costs;
- Increasing amount of unsolicited grassroots donations to CAC2; and
- Disciplined management of operating expenses.

As the graphs on the next page show, CAC2 took in significantly more revenue than it paid out in expenses in its early years, primarily due to conservative expense management. Also, the sponsorship program for the research conference at Cold Spring Harbor Laboratories in Fiscal Year 3 proved particularly strong.



With more predictability in CAC2's revenue base, the Board of Directors appropriately began to increase investment in operational support for CAC2, participation in key meetings to forge deeper connections with stakeholders, and relaunching the Hope Portal. As a result of our investment in the organization's operations and influence, the positive variance in operating income has decreased in the past few years; yet CAC2 has managed its operating budget to a positive variance each year so far – and will continue to practice disciplined financial oversight to ensure sustainability.

A positive trend worth highlighting this year:

Member Support (beyond dues) has grown to nearly 40% of our donation revenue.

CAC2 members account for an increasing amount of philanthropic support to CAC2 above their membership dues. Although CAC2 members account for only 5% of the number of donations/grant received this year, they account for 40% of donation/grant revenue. There has also been a notable increase in grassroots donations via community-based fundraising – doubling from the previous fiscal year. This support is a result of CAC2 members' efforts, such as the 5th Annual Erin's Dream Race (in loving memory of Erin Buenger), individual member Mary Beth Collins raising awareness through a celebration of survivorship of her son Josh, and a variety of members' personal fundraisers on Facebook. Trends like this are heartwarming, because they indicate the positive extent to which CAC2's mission – and how CAC2 works to fulfill that mission collaboratively – resonates with nonmembers and members alike.

As always, CAC2 is especially grateful for the volunteerism of its dedicated membership and Board of Directors as well as the philanthropic support of its partners and contributors. We rely on the donations of people's time, energy, and skills, as well as financial support to deliver our mission. We thank everyone who has believed in CAC2 throughout its first six years and has enabled our membership to achieve "7 for 7" in delivering projects in our foundational pillars of Awareness and Advocacy, Family Support and Survivorship, and Research and Treatment. We look forward to helping shape a bright future for childhood cancer patients, survivors, and their families through powerful ideas, teamwork, and even greater levels of support.

CHILDHOOD CANCER **FACTS**

Cancer is the number one cause of death by disease among children.¹

The incidence of childhood cancer is on the increase, averaging 0.6% increase per year since mid 1970's resulting in an overall increase of 24% over the last 40 years.2

43 children per day, or15,780 children per year are expected to be diagnosed with cancer.²

1 in 285 children was diagnosed with cancer in 2014.²

Childhood cancer is not one disease – there are more than 12 major types of pediatric cancers and over 100 subtypes.2

Since 1980, only four drugs have been approved in the first instance for use in children. Fewer than eight total drugs, consisting of the three above and five others also approved for use in adults, have been developed for use in children with cancer – compared with hundreds of drugs that have been developed specifically for adults only.3

On average, about 17% of children die within five years of diagnosis. Among those children who survive to five years from diagnosis, 18% will die within 30 years of diagnosis.4

There are 70 potential life years lost on average when a child dies of cancer compared to 15 potential life years lost for adults. 5

Those who survive the five years have an eight times greater mortality rate due to the increased risk of liver and heart disease and increased risk for reoccurrence of the original cancer or of a secondary cancer. 6

Childhood cancer threatens every aspect of the family's life and the possibility of a future, which is why optimal cancer treatment must include psychosocial care. 7

More than 95% of childhood cancer survivors will have a significant health related issue by the time they are 45 years of age; these health issues are side-effects of either the cancer or more commonly, the result of its treatment. 1/3 will suffer severe and chronic side effects; 1/3 will suffer moderate to severe health problems; and 1/3 will suffer slight to moderate side effects.8

Symptoms of post traumatic stress disorder are well documented for parents whose children have completed cancer treatment.9

Childhood cancer survivors reported higher rates of pain, fatigue, and sleep difficulties compared with siblings and peers, all of which are associated with poorer quality of life.10

IMPACT

Our 2018-19 initiatives and projects reflect our members' shared goals and values put into action. We have worked to unify our members and build trust and credibility with our partners. We have provided opportunities for our broad and diverse membership to work together within our three Interest Groups, while guaranteeing that they have ample opportunity to learn, share information, and build bridges within and across the community.

We had our most active and impactful year ever in *advocacy and awareness*. We pushed for and won full appropriations for the STAR Act in 2018 and 2019 and provided substantive input into the implementation of that law. CAC2 joined venue host, Seattle Children's Hospital, and presenting sponsor, Juno Therapeutics, in welcoming our attendees to Seattle for our 5th Annual Summit in June, 2018. The two-day meeting featured rich programming that highlighted the many ways we and our partners in the community have an impact on children with cancer and their families. This theme was carried throughout the speaker line-up, panels and break-out sessions, and various networking opportunities.

Our speaker line-up placed the spotlight on a variety of areas crucial for building progress for our community. Attendees were afforded a robust and energized opportunity to engage with experts who presented on a wide range of topics. Presenters and panelists covered the impact of immunotherapy in children's cancers, the overlap between teen and young adult cancer experiences and that of children, and ethical considerations for a child-centered approach to clinical research.

We also heard presentations related to the implementation of the community's successful advocacy efforts that addressed the implementation of both the STAR Act and impending changes to PREA. We celebrated the re-launch of the Hope Portal to serve patients and families with better access to support services.



Partnering for Lasting Impact

Collaborating to provide funding data in a central repository of pediatric cancer research studies is an effective means to assess funding priorities and gaps. In addition, it has helped to raise awareness in the cancer community about relevant funding projects and potential for partnerships.

The CAC2 Research Database Team convened in 2014 to explore options to fulfill aspects of the core mission of CAC2 as it relates to research funding: coordinated action, information exchange, education & learning, and broad-based collaboration. After diligent research, CAC2 joined the International Cancer Research Partnership (ICRPartnership. org), whose database houses all types of cancer research from organizations worldwide. This partnership provides CAC2 members full access to view funded projects, as well as information on researchers from around the world. This database currently hosts information about over 550 childhood cancer research projects funded by CAC2 members. Together we are making the database more robust and creating a more accurate view of the childhood cancer research landscape.



The partnership between CAC2 and ICRP has led to a greater understanding of the science CAC2 member organizations fund as a whole and allows members to see their data in a new way. Once submitted, data can be sliced by Common Scientific Outline (CSO) code, type of cancer, or project type, allowing organizations to see their funding strengths and opportunities. The platform also allows them to see other organizations' priorities to assess alignment and develop future potential partnerships.

Through the ICRP, CAC2 has raised the profile of childhood cancer to cancer organizations all over the world. Since join-

ing the ICRP, a unique code has been retrospectively applied to the over 80,000 projects in the database, indicating if it has a childhood cancer application to make searching for these projects easier. Data provided to the ICRP by CAC2 members contributed to a first-time analysis of the childhood cancer data set from all ICRP members. Childhood cancer funding differs from overall cancer funding by concentrating on etiology, treatment, and control/survivorship, while adult cancer research focuses on biology, prevention, diagnosis, and prognosis.
