




February 15th

- International Childhood Cancer Day (ICCD) which was founded in 2002 by Childhood Cancer International (CCI) is celebrated around the world each year on February 15th.
- CCI a global network of 171 member organizations in 88 countries founded in 1994.
- Committed to working with its international partners including the World Health Organization, SIOP, and others, towards the global goal of reducing childhood cancer mortality and the elimination of cancer-related pain and suffering.
- ACCO is U.S. founding member of CCI; I currently serve as CCI President and work hand in hand with the WHO, IAEA and other international organizations.



Global Disparity



- Each year, more than 300,000 children ages birth to 19 years are diagnosed with cancer around the world.
- Approximately 8 in 10 of these children live in low and middle-income countries where their survival rate is often near 20%.
- This is in stark contrast to high-income countries, where cure rates exceed 80% for many common childhood cancers.

WHO GLOBAL CHILDHOOD CANCER INITIATIVE

• On September 28, 2018 at the United Nations General Assembly, the World Health Organization (WHO) announced its new global initiative to address the disparity between childhood cancer survival in low-middle versus high-income countries.



WHO TARGET GOALS

Advocacy Message: The Two Target Goals of the WHO Global Childhood Cancer Initiative are:

- 1. Achieve at least 60% survival for all children diagnosed with cancer around the world by 2030. This represents an approximate doubling of the current cure rate and will save an additional one million children's lives over the next decade.
- 2. Eliminate all pain and suffering of children fighting cancer.



Childhood Cancer is a Global Problem.

People under 20 years old comprise:

People under 15 years old comprise:


26% of the global population in low-resourced regions like sub-Saharan Africa

Palliative Care for Children

The active, total care of the child's body, mind, and spirit



Begins at diagnosis and continues whether or not the child receives treatment for the disease.



Involves
supporting the
entire family as
well as the child.



Requires a multidisciplinary approach that makes use of community resources.



Can be provided in tertiary care facilities, community health centres, and children's homes.
