2023 Year in Review: Pediatric Cancer Federal Legislation

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Houston, Texas

2023 Action Days: April 24-25

Gathered more than 200 advocates from 34 states

Consisted of 1 day of education + 1 day of visits to Capitol Hill

Advocated for robust FY2024 funding of the NIH and NCI

Sought support for full funding of the STAR Act and Childhood Cancer Data Initiative (CCDI)

June 5, 2018 signed into law – Public Law No. 115-180

Childhood Cancer STAR Reauthorization Act

- In December 2022, Congress unanimously passed the Childhood Cancer STAR Reauthorization ACT of 2022 to continue for 5 more years (FY2024-2028)
 - S.4120 (117th Congress) led by Chris Van Hollen (D-MD), Jack Reed (D-RI), Shelley Moore Capito (R-WV), and Lisa Murkowski (R-AK) + 35 additional cosponsors
 - H.R.7630 (117th Congress) led by Michael McCaul (R-TX), Jackie Speier (D-CA),
 G.K. Butterfield (D-NC) and Mike Kelly (R-PA) + 106 additional co-sponsors
 - Signed into law on January 5, 2023 (Public Law No. 117-350)
- During Action Days 2023, advocates pushed to appropriate \$30 million to fully fund for a 6th year

Gabriella Miller Kids First Research Act

- Gabriella Miller Kids First Research Act (1.0)
 - Signed into law April 3, 2014 (Public Law No. 113-94)
 - Authorized \$12.6 million in annual funds for childhood disease research through FY2023
 - Kids First Data Resource Center
- Gabriela Miller Kids First Research Act (2.0)
 - Funding sunset in 2023
 - Re-introduction of legislation (S.1624/H.R.3391)
 - Expected to build on foundation from the last decade of discovery



Comprehensive Cancer Survivorship Act (CCSA)

- Landmark legislation
 (H.R. 4363/S. 2213) re-introduced
 in late June 2023
- Aims to address gaps in research and availability of treatments and services for survivors of cancer across the continuum of their care
- Re-introduction of bills led by Representatives Debbie
 Wasserman Schultz (FL-23), Brian
 Fitzpatrick (PA-1) and Mark
 DeSaulnier (CA-10) along with
 Senators Amy Klobuchar (MN) and
 Ben Cardin (MD)

Comprehensive Cancer Survivorship Act (CCSA) H.R. 4363/S. 2213



Care Planning & Transition

Provides a Medicare service and payment for care planning and coordination services

Improves coordination of care and transition to primary care

Guides survivorship monitoring and follow-up care



Alternative Payment Model

Evaluates current payment system to develop a new model to ensure coordinated survivorship services across an episode of care



Navigation

Develops comprehensive navigation services to allow for care across the continuum of survivorship

Identifies health disparities and determinants of health

Comprehensive Cancer Survivorship Act (CCSA) H.R. 4363/S. 2213



Quality of Care

Establishes grants to promote innovations in care to allow for more efficiencies in care delivery and improved experiences and outcomes among survivors



Employment

Establishes employment assistance grants to assist patients, caregivers and families facing a variety of workforce challenges



Awareness & Education

Creates resources for survivors and health professionals to promote early detection and preventive care

Aids health professionals in providing high-quality services

Saving kids' lives at zero cost to taxpayers \$ 2897/HR 3433

Gives children the same chance as adults to beat cancer

Passed the House in the 117th Congress

Reintroduced in the 118th Congress

Amends the RACE for Children Act

Innovation in Pediatric Drugs Act of 2023

Aims to strengthen the Best Pharmaceuticals for Children Act (BPCA) and Pediatric Research Equality Act (PREA) by:

- Requiring drugs for rare diseases to be studied in children
- Granting the US FDA additional authority to penalize companies that don't complete required pediatric studies on time
- Increasing funding for the NIH BPCA Program to fund additional clinical trials and train additional personnel to help run trials

Policy Issues for Action Days



1) Federal Funding for Childhood Cancer Programs

In December 2022, Congress unanimously passed the Childhood Cancer STAR Reauthorization Act, allowing the programs from the STAR Act to continue for five more years.

Created in 2019, the Childhood Cancer Data Initiative to ensure that researchers learn from every child with cancer.

To continue this important work, we ask Congress to provide:

- \$30 million to fully fund the Childhood Cancer STAR Act for a sixth year
- \$50 million to fully fund the Childhood Cancer Data Initiative for a fifth year

1a) NIH and NCI Funding

We urge Congress to provide significant funding increases for the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and a proportional increase for the National Cancer Institute (NCI).

2) Cosponsor the Accelerating Kids' Access to Care Act (H.R. 4758/S. 2372)

Children with cancer often require specialized care from a specific provider or facility that may not be available in their home state.

Some patients face burdensome, unnecessary delays in accessing timesensitive care, including clinical trial enrollment, outside of their home state, which can cause a child's condition to worsen.

This bill reduces regulatory burdens to allow children with complex medical needs greater access to out-of-state providers who can best meet their needs.

3) Cosponsor the Pediatric Cancer Drug Supply Act (H.R. – For House Members Only

Drug shortages significantly impact children with cancer and the health professionals who care for them.

Providers are forced to ration key pediatric cancer drugs, delaying treatment for children and creating a disruption to clinical trials. More than half of childhood patients, survivors, and families reported experiencing a drug shortage during their treatment.

This bill creates a pilot program that directs HHS to establish and maintain a 6-month reserve of essential childhood cancer chemotherapy drugs.
